On 9 June 2022, you emailed the Ministry of Social Development (the Ministry) requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act), the following information:

- 1. How many children are included in applications made for Social Housing in New Zealand as at 31 March 2022?
- 2. How many children included in applications for social housing are on the Social housing register awaiting housing as at March 31 2022 in New Zealand?
- 3. How many children are in emergency accommodation as at March 31 2022 in New Zealand?
- 4. How many children are in insecure housing on the social housing register as at March 31 2022 in New Zealand?
- 5. How many children are classed as not in insecure housing are on the social housing register as at 31 March 2022 in New Zealand?
- 6. How many children are attached to the transfer register awaiting a transfer as at 31 March 2022 in New Zealand?
- 7. How many adults and children in total are attached to the applications for social housing or transfer in New Zealand as 31 March 2022?
- 8. What are the ethnicity of the ones attached to the applications for social housing in New Zealand as at 31 March 2022?
- 9. How many on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 3 months as at 31-3-2022 in New Zealand?
- 10. How many children on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 3 months as at 31-3-2022 in New Zealand?

- 11. How many on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing more than 3 months but less than 12 months as at 31-3-2022 in New Zealand?
- 12. How many children on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing more than 3 months but less than 12 months as at 31-3-2022 in New Zealand?
- 13. How many on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 12 months as at 31-3-2022 in New Zealand?
- 14. How many children on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 12 months as at 31-3-2022 in New Zealand?
- 15. What is the longest time children have been on the social housing register and in emergency or transitional housing as at the 30 Sept 31-3-2022 in New Zealand.

- 19. How many children are in insecure housing on the social housing register as at March 31 2022 in Tairawhiti?
- 20. How many children are classed as not in insecure housing are on the social housing register as at 31 March 2022 in Tairawhiti?
- 21. How many children are attached to the transfer register awaiting a transfer as at 31 March 2022 in Tairawhiti?
- 22. How many adults and children in total are attached to the applications for social housing or transfer in Tairawhiti as 31 March 2022?
- 23. What are the ethnicity of the ones attached to the applications for social housing in Tairawhiti as at 31 March 2022?
- 24. How many on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 3 months as at 31-3-2022?
- 25. How many children on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 3 months as at 31-3-2022?
- 26. How many on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing more than 3 months but less than 12 months as at 31-3-2022?

- 27. How many children on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing more than 3 months but less than 12 months as at 31-3-2022?
- 28. How many on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 12 months as at 31-3-2022?
- 29. How many children on the social housing register have been in emergency or transitional housing longer than 12 months as at 31-3-2022?
- 30. What is the longest time children have been on the social housing register and in emergency or transitional housing as at the 30 Sept 31-3-2022?

The transitional housing aspects of questions 9-15 and 24-30 were transferred to the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) on 15 June 2022, in accordance with section 14 of the Act, as these questions are more closely aligned with their functions. You can expect a response from HUD in due course.

On 8 July 2022, the Ministry emailed you to advise you that due to the similar nature of your two requests and the Ministry receiving them both of the same day, the Ministry will respond to both of your requests in one response.

The Ministry also advised in the same email that more time was required for necessary consultations to take place, as such, the due date of your request was extended to 9 August 2022 in accordance with section 15(1) and 15A of the Act.

- **Table One:** Clients on the Public Housing Register Waitlist, as at 31 March 2022, broken down by region, household type and accommodation security.
- **Table Two:** Clients on the Public Housing Register Waitlist, as at 31 March 2022, broken down by region, household type and total response ethnicity.
- **Table Three:** Emergency Housing Special Needs Grant clients who are also on the Public Housing Register waitlist, as at 31 March 2022, broken down by region, household type and total response ethnicity.
- **Table Four:** Duration in Emergency Housing and number of children for clients who are also on the Public Housing Register waitlist, as at 31 March 2022, broken down by region, duration in Emergency Housing and household type.

- Prior to 29 March 2020, Duration in EH was based on the number of weeks in which the client has received an EH SNG. After four weeks with no grants, the consecutive count is reset to zero and a new spell in EH is begun.
- Post 29 March 2020, Duration in EH is calculated based on the check in and check out dates for which EHSNGs have been granted.
- In some cases, children may have alternative or alternating living arrangements and may not necessarily be living in EH for the entire duration in EH.
- Children may also be counted more than once, as the Ministry are unable to verify if the child/children are included in more than one household living in EH.
