Emergency housing is short-term accommodation (usually in motels) for individuals who have an urgent need because they are unable to remain in their usual place of residence. It is funded through Special Needs Grants that clients apply for when they cannot access accommodation and we have explored all the other options available to them. Grants can cover between one and 21 nights of accommodation at a time.







Commentary


The number of households in emergency housing continued to trend down since January 2022, reaching an all time low of 3,342 households in December. There were 1,401 (30 percent) fewer households in emergency housing between these months.


Most regions saw a decrease in the number of households in emergency housing last month, except Waikato, East Coast and Wellington.


The number of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants (EH-SNGs) has dropped by nearly 4,900 last month, with \$2.7 million more granted. This is consistent to previous seasonal trends as there were fewer working days over the holiday period and clients are staying more nights.


Emergency housing – at the end of the month











Public Housing Register | 31 Dec 2022 |

The Public Housing Register is a non-time bound list of all applicants eligible to be placed in public housing. Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.




Public Housing Register numbers















Public Housing Register flow



Commentary

There were 28,167 applications in the Public Housing Register as at the end of December 2022, a decrease of 333 (12 percent) compared to the end of November.

Most regions had a decrease in applications in November, except Waikato, East Coast and Southern.

System improvements continued to be undertaken to increase the capacity for register management. These improvements have resulted in the completion of one year's worth of housing register conversations in 12 weeks, along with an increase of public housing applications with closure pending status. This trend is likely to continue over the next few months as improvements are completed.

MSD reports total response ethnicity.
