### **Emergency Housing SNGs** | May 2022 |

Emergency Housing is short-term accommodation (usually in motels) for individuals who have an urgent need because they are unable to remain in their usual place of residence. It is funded through Special Needs Grants that clients apply for when they cannot access accommodation and we have explored all the other options available to them. Grants can cover between one and 21 nights of accommodation at a time.





### Commentary

May 2022 saw a slight increase in both the number of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants and the amount granted, rising by 912 (8.6%) and \$1.4 M (4.4%) respectively.

This increase follows lower grant levels last month, driven by fewer working days. The number of clients issued an EH SNG was similar to last month.


There were 4,329 households in in Emergency Housing at the end of May 2022, a decrease of 147 (3.3%). This reduction was largely driven by the Auckland and Wellington regions.


The proportion of clients with children has remained at approximately 51%, after increasing in February 2022.


During the month of May, the average duration of stay for a household was stable at 22.8 weeks.


### Emergency Housing - At the end of the month











## Public Housing Register | 31 May 2022

The Public Housing Register is a non-time bound list of all applicants eligible to be placed in Public Housing. Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.

















### Public housing - Register flow



#### Commentary

The number of live applications on the Public Housing Register has decreased slightly, dropping by 168 (0.51%). This is the first decrease since July 2021.

This reduction was largely driven by decreases in the Auckland region.

Four regions saw a decrease in applications in May. These were: Auckland (157), Central (42), Northland (32) and Southern (18).

The slight decrease in live applications reflects 78 (4.3%) fewer new applications compared to last month, as well as increase of 93 (17.7%) in the number of people housed.

MSD reports total response ethnicity.
