On 3 June 2016 you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, information regarding mobile squads.

You were recently provided with information regarding the Non-Government Organisation-led mobile response teams. You were also provided with a number of daily briefings on this topic.

You will find enclosed various internal correspondence containing mention of mobile teams and/or Ministry staff visiting Bruce Pulman Park between 2 June 2016 and 3 June 2016. Note that duplicate correspondence and correspondence deemed as out of scope of your request are not provided. The names and contact details of certain staff members are withheld under section 9(2)(a) of the Official Information Act. The need to protect the privacy of these individuals outweighs any public interest in this information.

Some information is also withheld under section 9(2)(g)(i) of the Act to protect the effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinions. I believe the greater public interest is in the ability of individuals to express opinions in the course of their duty.

I hope you find this information helpful. You have the right to seek an investigation and review of my response by the Ombudsman, whose address for contact purposes is:

PM's homeless remarks untrue - Sallies

False statements by the government this week have jeopardised Salvation Army's personnel and affected its ability to work with the homeless, the organisation says.

It said the government's claims that Ministry of Social Development (MSD) staff accompanied Salvation Army staff to visit homeless people in a South Auckland park were incorrect.

Yesterday Prime Minister John Key was talking about the "flying squad", dispatched earlier this week by the government to help the homeless, and gauge the level of the problem.

"On I think Tuesday or Wednesday night MSD and the Sallies went around and knocked on I think eight cars that they could find, all eight of those people refused to take support either from Sallies or from MSD."

The Salvation Army said it declined an offer by MSD officials to accompany them, as many of the people there had a deep distrust of government officials.

It said the false claims, and media images of homeless people in dire material hardship, had weakened the Salvation Army's ability to assist the homeless.

In the past few days, the Government and a government agency have made statements saying MSD officials accompanied Salvation Army personnel to visit homeless people living in Bruce Pulman Park in South Auckland.

These statements are incorrect.

MSD officials did not accompany Salvation Army social personnel to Bruce Pulman Park last Monday night, as part of the Army's regular visits to the site. The Salvation Army declined the offer by MSD officials to accompany The Salvation Army as some of these people are very wary of government officials.

The results of this statement, as well as recent images of homeless people living in dire material hardship disseminated by the media, have deeply upset these people and have put the relationship between them and Salvation Army personnel in jeopardy, weakening the Army's ability to assist them.

The Salvation Army does not knock on people's car windows. It has a van from which food, water and toiletries are made available and where access to social services and advocacy can be arranged.

The Salvation Army has spent years developing relationships and building trust with these people living on the outer margins of society – people who often have a deep distrust of officials.

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The Ministry of Social Development (MSD) is continuing to offer a community presence to make sure people in Auckland without a place to stay are getting the help they need.

MSD staff have been placed at Te Puea Marae, the Auckland City Mission, and continue to support mobile squads of Salvation Army and Strive workers who are actively engaging with homeless in the community.

Deputy Chief Executive Social Housing Carl Crafar says focussing on the help that is already available through Work and Income is the best way to get people the help they need, quickly.

"Local non-government organisations make up the mobile squads while we provide the support to make sure people are getting what they need – the help is there, and this is one way we can make sure those needing it are getting it."

To date, 15 people living in cars have been approached. One person, who was not homeless, has chosen to engage further with MSD

Staff have also been stationed at the Auckland City Mission.

"We have been at the City Mission four nights this week, and engaged with 16 people – with 11 social housing assessments booked," Carl Crafar says.

"Our presence will continue next week and we will keep working with community groups including local Marae to get people the help they need."

Not sure where MSD mobile Squads comes from. NGO's have been visiting various hot spots and we have been providing back office support by way of a 'virtual response team' for any urgent needs, booking appointments and to provide advice. We are not out on the road, this was the initial plan but the model arrived at in talking with police and NGO's is as above. We have also had a presence at City Mission. The data below is correct to date.

The issue Salvation Army has with us is

- 1) We were not with them at Bruce Pullman Park (actually this was at their express request as they were already working with people and their opinion was that having an MSD presence would displace the trust they had built over a period of time visiting the park.) We agreed to us providing support from the 'virtual response team' but received no contact.
- 2) Salvation Army are concerned that media coverage specific to their visit to the Park on Monday (i.e. the 10 seen) will have displaced the trust built up as it will be obvious that they have given us details of numbers seen and that MSD support was not requested.

From your understanding, do they have an issue with the below figures which will form the basis of our proactive media statement?

MSD Mobile Squads

To date (30 May to 2 June, inclusive):

A total of 396 people have been observed - at the Auckland City Mission (384) and in cars (12) at locations visited by NGOs.

- A total of 31 voluntary engagements with people have occurred.
 All were single people.
- The total number of cars observed at venues visited by NGOs is 15.
 - All were approached and only one person has chosen to engage with MSD, that person was not homeless.
- As a result of four nights visiting The Auckland City Mission, 16 people out of 384 chose to engage.

 Of these, 7 social housing assessments have been booked and a further 4 were already booked.

John Key: Homeless don't want help

The Government has this week sent its flying squads into Auckland to battle the hidden homeless crisis, but says those living in cars simply don't want help.

The squads were formed after The Nation revealed a number of people with full-time jobs were sleeping in cars because they couldn't afford housing in Auckland.

The Ministry of Social Development (MSD) teamed up with the Salvation Army and other non-Government organisations and hit the streets.

But the Prime Minister says when they hit Bruce Pullman Park in Takanini on Monday night, they received a frosty response.

"MSD and the Sallies went around and knocked on eight cars that they could find," he says.

"All eight of those people refused to take support either from Sallies or MSD."

John Key says he sn't implying people want to live in cars.

"I'm just simply saying that of those eight people that MSD and the Sallies could identify, knocked on the cars and asked them: 'can we give you support and can we give you help', not just MSD, the Salvation Army -- the eight of them refused."

As for the rest of the week, the squad also visited Mangere and Otahuhu, finding a total of 15 cars.

All had single people sleeping in them and only one chose to take up the Government's offer of help -- and the official report says that person isn't actually homeless.

But they did get a better response at the Auckland City Mission.

Across three nights, a total of 16 people from the Auckland City Mission chose to talk with MSD. Seven of them now have social housing assessments booked and four more already had assessments booked.

 - o All were single people.
- The total number of cars observed at venues visited by NGO's is 15.
 - o All were approached and only one person has chosen to engage with MSD, they were not homeless.

Media have suggested that it may be helpful if you, as the relationship manager, could contact Pam Hughes at the Salvation Army to smooth things over before the statement below goes out.

Our understanding is that the Minister's office provided the PM's office with the region's daily update. Those updates make it clear that MSD's role has been coordinating and supporting the NGO-led mobile response (through the provision of a 'virtual response'), but in talking colloquially about the response this has not come through clearly.

If you agree that it would be helpful to make contact with the Salvation Army, the following lines may be a helpful starting point – others may be able to suggest more appropriate lines.

- We acknowledge your concerns about the way MSD's role in the mobile response has been characterised in the media, and I'm happy to convey those concerns to others;
- It's important to note that the PM was speaking in colloquial terms about the various strands to our response to the homelessness situation in Auckland over the last week or two;
- It was not our intention to mislead anyone about the role MSD has played in the mobile response;
- We appreciate the role NGOs, including The Salvation Army, continue to play in connecting with the homeless community, and acknowledge the importance of those trust-based relationships;

 - All were single people.
- The total number of cars observed at venues visited by NGOs is 15.
 - All were approached and only one person has chosen to engage with MSD, that person was not homeless.
- As a result of four nights visiting The Auckland City Mission, 16 people out of 384 chose to engage.

Prime Minister John Key got it wrong, according to the Salvation Army.

The Salvation Army has confronted the Government about giving incorrect statements on visiting homeless people.

Prime Minister John Key said the Ministry of Social Development (MSD) had teamed up with the charitable organisation to engage with homeless people.

"MSD and the Sallies went around and knocked on eight cars that they could find," Key said.

"All eight of those people refused to take support either from Sallies or from MSD."

But the Salvation Army has denied the cooperation in a statement, saying they declined an offer by the government agency.

"In the past few days, the Government and a government agency have made statements saying MSD officials accompanied Salvation Army personnel to visit homeless people living in Bruce Pulman Park in South Auckland. These statements are incorrect."

"MSD officials did not accompany Salvation Army social personnel to Bruce Pulman Park last Monday night, as part of the Army's regular visits to the site.

The Salvation Army declined the offer by MSD officials to accompany them as some people had a "deep distrust" of government officials.

The relationship between the Salvation Army and homeless people had been "put in jeopardy" as a result of the Prime Minister's comments, and also of images of the homeless in the media. Ad Feedback

The Salvation Army also clarified it did not knock on people's car windows.

"It has a van from which food, water and toiletries are made available and where access to social services and advocacy can be arranged.

Director Salvation Army social policy and parliamentary unit director Ian Hutson said it was important the "miscommunication" between his organisation and MSD was corrected in the public eye

The Prime Minister and the Minister for Social Housing Paula Bennett have been contacted for comment. MSD said addressed any queries on the incorrect statements to the Minister.

It was continuing to "offer a community presence" in Auckland so people without a place to stay could get their help.

MSD staff have been placed at Te Puea Marae, and supported mobile squads of NGO workers who were engaging with homeless.

These statements are incorrect.

MSD officials did not accompany Salvation Army social personnel to Bruce Pulman Park last Monday night, as part of the Army's regular visits to the site. The Salvation Army declined the offer by MSD officials to accompany The Salvation Army as some of these people are very wary of government officials.

The results of this statement, as well as recent images of homeless people living in dire material hardship disseminated by the media, have deeply upset these people and have put the relationship between them and Salvation Army personnel in jeopardy, weakening the Army's ability to assist them.

The Salvation Army does not knock on people's car windows. It has a van from which food, water and toiletries are made available and where access to social services and advocacy can be arranged.

The Salvation Army has spent years developing relationships and building trust with these people living on the outer margins of society – people who often have a deep distrust of officials.
