On 12 September 2016 you emailed the Ministry requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following information:

- All correspondence from Bryan Perry to any Minister's office including emails since 1 July 2016
- All reports, advice, aide memoires, working papers, briefings, memos where Bryan Perry is or is one of the authors to any Minister's office since 1 July 2016

The Ministry has decided to grant your request in part.

Please find enclosed a copy of all email correspondence from Bryan Perry to any Minister's Office, since 1 July 2016. This correspondence includes advice from Bryan Perry.

Some information has been withheld under section 9(2)(g)(i) of the Act to protect the effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinions. I believe the greater public interest is in the ability of individuals to express opinions in the course of their duty.

You will also note that the names of some individuals are withheld under section 9(2)(a) of the Act in order to protect the privacy of natural persons. The need to protect the privacy of these individuals outweighs any public interest in this information.

As you are likely aware, the following documents are publically available on the Ministry website at: www.msd.govt.nz/about-msd-and-our-work/publications-resources/monitoring/household-incomes/index.html:

- the August 2016 report 'Household incomes in New Zealand: Trends in indicators of inequality and hardship 1982 to 2015' (referred to in the emails as the 'Incomes Report'),
- the associated summary, 'The 2016 Household Incomes Report and the companion report using Non-income Measures (the NIMs Report): Summary' (referred to in the emails as the 'Summary' document),
- 'The material wellbeing of NZ households: Overview and Key Findings' Referred to in the emails as the 'Overview' document) and

• 'The material wellbeing of New Zealand households: trends and relativities using non-income measures, with international comparisons' (referred to in the email as the 'NIMs report').

The documents 'Communications Plan' and 'Likely media focus and questions from elsewhere', which were prepared prior to the release of the 'Incomes Report' are withheld in full under section 9(2)(g)(i) of the Act to protect the effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinions. I believe the greater public interest is in the ability of individuals to express opinions in the course of their duty.

As you will note, the document 'Graph briefing doc' is withheld almost in its entirety. The graphs appear in the published reports, but at the stage the graphs were provided in this document, they had not been through the complete quality assurance process. As such, the majority of the document is withheld under section 9(2)(g)(i) of the Act to protect the effective conduct of public affairs through the free and frank expression of opinions. I believe the public interest in this material is met by the publication of the final versions of the graphs.

The principles and purposes of the Official Information Act 1982 under which you made your request are:

- to create greater openness and transparency about the plans, work and activities of the Government,
- to increase the ability of the public to participate in the making and administration of our laws and policies and
- to lead to greater accountability in the conduct of public affairs.

This Ministry fully supports those principles and purposes. The Ministry therefore intends to make the information contained in this letter and attached documents available to the wider public after ten working days. The Ministry will do this by publishing this letter and attachments on the Ministry of Social Development's website. Your personal details will be deleted and the Ministry will not publish any information that would identify you as the person who requested the information.

Student poverty study reveals disparities

University of Acadeland - 18 July 2016

Almost one in five secondary school students and nearly half of all Pacific young people in New Zealand, live in poverty, according to a new study from the University of Auckland.

Results showed that 20 percent of New Zealand young people are living in households experiencing socio-economic hardship or poverty.

The significant ethnic disparities also showed that among Māori secondary school students, almost one third live in households experiencing poverty.

The study, just published in the International Journal for Equity in Health, investigated the association between socio-economic deprivation and secondary school students' health.

Researchers examined indicators of socio-economic deprivation, using data from the Youth 2012 study of 8500 secondary school students. They also studied the links between household poverty, neighbourhood deprivation and health indicators.

"The 20 percent finding is a similar result to other methods of estimating poverty such as those used by the Ministry of Social Development and the Child Poverty Action Group," says researcher Associate Professor Simon Denny, from the University's Adolescent Health Research Group.

The study grouped students by household poverty based on nine indicators of deprivation, including no car, no phone, no computer, parental worry about not having enough money for food, more than two people sharing a bedroom, no holiday with their families, moving home more than twice that year garages or living rooms used as bedrooms, and no parent at home with employment.

Students needed to report two or more indicators before they were classified as experiencing poverty.

Researchers also examined the interaction between household deprivation with depressive symptoms, cigarette smoking, and opesity.

"There were two groups of young people living in poverty," says Dr Denny.
"Fifteen percent were showing the effects of unaffordable housing and moderate levels of being unable to afford basic necessities."

"A further five percent experienced unaffordable housing and very high levels of material hardship, such as being unable to pay for basic necessities like a car, a phone, or food."

"One of the findings was that young people from households experiencing socioeconomic hardship and living in rich neighbourhoods, did worse than young people from households experiencing socioeconomic hardship and living in poor neighbourhoods," says Dr Denny.

They also experienced more depressive symptoms and higher rates of cigarette smoking.

"This was probably from being unable to participate in these communities due to being unable to afford it," he says. "But it could also reflect better social safety nets in lower socioeconomic communities."

Depressive symptoms and cigarette smoking were two to three times higher in the poverty groups compared to those students not experiencing poverty.

There were also higher rates of overweight and obesity among students experiencing poverty.

"Policies are needed that address household poverty alongside efforts to reduce socio-economic inequalities in neighbourhoods," says Dr Denny.

The reports and the release

- a suite of three documents this year:
 - o Household Incomes Report
 - the companion report using non-income measures such as the ability to keep the home warm, pay the bills, repair the appliances, have a couple of decent pair of shoes, a good meal each day, purchase commonly desired non-essentials, and so on (the NIMs report)
 - a 40-page Overview and Key Findings document this replaces the Overview that used to be at the front of the Incomes Report
- they update previous releases with analysis from Statistics New Zealand's 2014-15 Household Economic Survey (HES)
- MSD business-as-usual website release proposed for 9.30am Thu 8 Sep. No MSD media release.

The HES incomes data

• The survey runs from July one year to June the next. The HES income question asks about incomes in the 12 months prior to the interview. This means therefore that for the 2014-15 HES, for example, the income data mainly reflects incomes in calendar 2014.

Headline findings

- Strong real income growth for most income groups from HES 2008-09 to HES 2014-15 ...
 - o BHC median up 3% pain real terms in the post SFC recovery phase (ie 3% pa above CPI)
 - o net gains of around 10% in real terms from HES 2008-09 to 2014-15 for all income groups from the top of the bettorn decile (R16) up
 - o this is better than many OEOU countries whose middle incomes have been flat since the GFC (eg UK, Ireland, France, Italy, Germany, and the US)
- ... but

the rises at P10 (top of bottom decile) mainly reflect rises in real terms for NZS in recent years – incomes for beneficiaries and those reliant on minimum wage jobs (many of whom are in the bottom decile) remained steady in real terms so did not contribute to the P10 rise

- the trajectory of incomes after deducting housing costs (AHC) is less favourable for the medium to long-term picture as housing costs now make up a much larger proportion of the household budget for most so, for example, P10 AHC incomes in 2015 are still a little lower in real terms than P10 incomes were in the 1980s, whereas BHC incomes are higher in 2015 for all income groups.
- There is no evidence of any sustained rising or falling trend in <u>BHC</u> household income inequality over the last two decades using the Gini and top 1% share measures
 - the share of income received by the top 1% of tax-payers has been steady in the 7-9% range since the mid 1990s, up from 5% in the late 1980s
 - o the Gini measure of inequality is a popular one, but because it uses information on all household incomes it is susceptible to showing large fluctuations because of sampling issues for very high income households:
 - the 2015 HES (like the 2011 HES) has an unusually high number of very high income households which leads to a high Gini number and makes the Gini trend unstable
 - for the lower 99% there is no evidence of any sustained rising or falling trend in the last 20 years, using the Gini
 - we know from the tax records that the trend for the top 1% share is also flat, so

- there is no evidence from the Gini measure of any sustained rising or falling trend for household income inequality in the last twenty years.¹
- apart from a blip in 2011, the 90:10 ratio was flat from 2004 to 2015, and like the top 1% measure the 90:10 showed a large rise from the last 1980s to the early 1990s there was a slight rise in the 90:10 ratio from the mid 1990s to the mid 2000s, but much less than the earlier large rise
- o incomes after deducting housing costs (AHC incomes) are more unequal than BHC incomes, as housing costs make up a higher proportion of the household budget for lower income households than they do for higher income households. AHC income inequality was a little higher from 2011 to 2015 compared with the mid 2000s and earlier.

Housing affordability issues (rent, mortgage, rates ... relative to income) remain for the lower two income quintiles

- o 43% in the bottom income quintile had housing outgoings of more than 30% of income, and 32% spent more than 40% of their income
- o these are high historically, but it does look as if the rates have plateaued for both @ ar
- o as at June 2016, 50% of all renters receiving AS paid more than half of their total income on housing, up from 40% in 2007 (MSD admin data)
- o there are regional variations, as indicated by analysis of rental information, for example ... but reliable HES-based regional analysis is not feasible because of sample size.

There are some housing quality issues, especially for children – they are concentrated among those already experiencing material hardship on other basis items

- o for 10% of children, their household reports a major problem with dampness and mould (~110,000 children)
- o for 13% of children, a major problem with heating /keeping it warm in winter (~140,000)
- o for 7% of children, their household reports both issues (~75,000)
- o 70% of those reporting these issues live in rental accommodation 45% are in private rental and 25% in HWZC touses with the rates around 15% and 35% respectively
- o 80% of the problems are reported by the lowest material wellbeing quintile.

• Low income (poverty) and material hardship trends for children are flat or falling depending on the start date or measure used

for monitoring trends, the reports use as their primary measures:
- a fixed line income measure AHC, 50% and 60% of median
A paterial hardship measure with a less and a more severe threshold

child numbers using an AHC anchored 50% of median line are down from their GFC peak of 200,000 to 170,000 on average in 2014 and 2015, a little below pre-GFC numbers

using the higher AHC anchored 60% of median line numbers are down from 275,000 at their peak in the GFC to 240,000 on average in 2014 and 2015, a little below pre-GFC numbers

- o child material hardship numbers are down from 220,000 in the GFC to 150,000 on the standard EU measure, and are fairly steady around 80,000 to 100,000 on the more severe EU measure
- o relative income poverty was up in 2013-14 because the median rose 5% while lower incomes were flat or slightly rising much was made by some of the "45,000 rise in child poverty

Last year's Incomes Report said that "there is still no conclusive evidence of any sustained rise or fall in income inequality since the mid 1990s but that if the next survey shows a Gini at or above this year's level, then that will be reasonable evidence of a rise compared with a decade previously". The Gini did rise, but given that both the top 1% and the 90:10 trends remained flat, MSD further investigated the impact on the Gini of issues with very high incomes in the HES. It concluded that sampling issues for very high income households were making the Gini measure unreliable and misleading when all incomes were included in the analysis, noting that the issue was particularly serious for HES 2014-15. Statistics NZ and the Treasury support MSD's analysis and conclusion.

numbers" – this is an example of why the reports recommend against the use of fully relative measures for monitoring trends in the short to medium term, and against reading too much into year-on-year trends.

The material wellbeing of the vast majority of older New Zealanders continues to be good to very good

- the 65+ have lower AHC income poverty rates and lower hardship rates than other age groups
- o internationally, older New Zealanders have very low hardship rates in league tables for the richer countries
- the relatively good position reflects the mix of universal public provision (mainly NZS) and the private provision built up by most of the current cohort over their lifetime a key component of this private provision is mortgage-free home ownership which is relatively high among the current cohort.
- there is high dependence on NZS for most: for example, 60% of singles and 30% of couples report less than \$100 pw per capita from non-government sources
- o the small group (4-8%) that do have financial challenges are, unsurprisinally those who rent and have little other than NZS for income
- o declining mortgage-free home ownership for the cohorts approaching retirement, and elevated low income rates for older working age adults living on their own suggest that this small group (4-8%) may grow in coming years.

The "working poor" remain an issue for NZ as for other OECD countries

- even with the assistance from WFF and chitd-care subsidies, an estimated one third to one half of children in hardship are from working families with no benefit income in the previous 12 months
- this is a real challenge for most OECD countries, and policies to help grow employment, provide jobs with credible pathways to higher wages, improve educational achievement and lift wages and are central to addressing it

International comparisons

- o strong broad-based income growth from 2008 (just before GFC) to 2015, better than many others in OECD (eg US, Ireland, France, Spain, UK)
- o household income inequality (BHC) flat and just above the OECD average

note: very few countries collect housing cost information in their income surveys, so there are no international league tables for AHC income inequality

household wealth inequality about average for the OECD

handship rates for older New Zealanders very low, with NZ in the top 5 along with Norway and Denmark

child material hardship rate at the EU median for the expanded EU, but NZ rates are above the rates for the richer western European countries with whom we have traditionally compared ourselves.

Appendix

- UN's Sustainable Development Goals
 - o In September 2015 all 193 UN member states formally adopted the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development which includes a new set of global goals (the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs)) which replace the Millenium Development Goals (MDGs). One of the differences between the SDGs and MDGs is that the SDGs are universal rather than just focussing on "developing countries".
 - one of the targets for Goal #1 is that member states "by 2030, reduce at least by half the proportion of men, women and children of all ages living in poverty in all its dimensions according to national definitions" (Goal 1.2)
 - one of the targets for Goal #10 is that member states "by 2030, progressively achieve and sustain income growth of the bottom 40% of the population at a rate higher than the national average" (Goal 10.1).
 - o The indicators for all these matters are already covered by the reports
- A common misunderstanding: attributing some or all of the list-of deprivations surveyed in the HES and elsewhere to all children in low-income households
 - o not all children in low-income households are in hardship and not all children in hardship are from low-income households there is an overlap of only around 40%, as there are factors other than income that determine living standards
 - o nevertheless, some commentators, NGOs and others develop a narrative that starts with a high number of children in low-income households, then goes on to make it sound as if all these children suffer many serious deprivations this is not the case, and it ignores the specific advice and warnings in the reports (these have been further strengthened this year)
 - o an example using a specific item illustrates the fallack
 - HES collects information on major problem with dampness and mould"
 - for children in households in the bottom AHC income quintile (ie around 27% of all children), "only" 17% live in homes that report this issue this is around half of all the 110,000 children in households reporting dampness or mould as a major problem
 - though this is 17% more than what most would consider acceptable, it is well off
 - and 110,000 is much less than 300,000

when households are ranked by their MWI (or DEP-17) rather than income, the households with these sorts of issues get better identified and they cluster at the bottom - when looking at the bottom quintile using the MWI, 28% of children are in households reporting the issue, around three quarters of all the 110,000 children in households reporting dampness or mould as a major problem

a recent occurrence of this misinformation occurred in the week of 15 August in two Op Eds in the Guardian by a freelancing New Zealander, with support from UNICEF New Zealand – it lead to a PQ to Hon Tolley.
