On 9 September 2020, you emailed the Ministry of Social Development (the Ministry) requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982 (the Act), the following information:

- The total number of COVID-19 Income Relief Payment (CIRP) applications lodged from 8 June 2020 to 28 August 2020 broken down into: ethnicity, gender and MSD region
- 2. How many people were declined a CIRP payment and subsequently went onto a benefit?

The CIRP has been available since 8 June 2020 and provides temporary financial support to clients who have lost employment due to the impacts of COVID-19. Clients can receive the payment for a maximum of 12 weeks. Eligibility to the CIRP is largely based on the individual's circumstances.

Please find enclosed in Appendix One the following tables:

- Table One: The number of CIRP applications from 8 June 2020 to 28 August 2020, broken down by MSD region
- Table Two: The number of CIRP applications from 8 June 2020 to 28 August 2020, broken down by gender

- Table Four: The number of CIRP applications declined from 8 June to 28 August 2020 and the number of people that were subsequently granted a main benefit

- The ethnicity classification that is used to construct this table does not necessarily align with the current Statistics New Zealand classification of ethnicity. Ethnicity details recorded by the Ministry have been gathered under a variety of classification methods as clients come into contact with the Ministry. The ethnicity data may be self-identified based on an individual's preference or self-construct. While the Ministry collects multiple ethnicities from clients, we only report a unique form of 'identified' ethnicity for core benefit data (one ethnic group per person with Māori coming first, Pacific groups second followed by other groups ending with NZ European).

- This is a count of applications, not clients.
- Main benefits for those of working age include: Jobseeker Support (JS), Sole Parent Support (SPS),
 Supported Living Payment (SLP), Youth Payment and Young Parent Payment (YP/YPP), Emergency
 Benefit (EB), Emergency Maintenance Allowance (EMA), Jobseeker Support Student Hardship
 (JSSH), Widow's Benefit Overseas (WBO), and Sole Parent Support Overseas (SPSO).
- The category called 'declined' in the Ministry's administrative systems includes people who apply
 for the CIRP but find they would be better off on a benefit. As a result, their application for CIRP is
 then withdrawn, which shows up in the Ministry's systems as a 'decline', as the application is
 cancelled.
