On 22 November 2020, you emailed the Ministry of Social Development (the Ministry) requesting, under the Official Information Act 1982, the following information:

1. *For each of the past five financial years and so far for the present one, how much money has MSD paid to emergency accommodation providers nationwide? How much of this has been recovered by the Ministry from tenants/people using the accommodation.*
2. *For each of the past five financial years and so far for the present one, how much money has MSD paid to emergency accommodation providers in Manawātū? How much of this has been recovered by the Ministry from tenants/people using the accommodation. Can question two be broken down by provider.*
3. *As at November 1 each year for the past five years and this one, how many people were staying at an emergency accommodation provider paid for by the Ministry nationwide.*
4. *As at November 1 each year for the past five years and this one, how many people were staying at an emergency accommodation provider paid for by the Ministry in Manawātū.*

On 2 December 2020, the Ministry contacted you to clarify your request. The Ministry asked if you would like Palmerston North data included in the response as this does not fall in the Manawātū Territorial Local Authority (TLA) Boundaries. The Ministry later received a response confirming that you would like Palmerston North data included.

The Emergency Housing Special Needs Grant (EH SNG) is available to people who cannot remain in their usual place or residence, if any, and do not have access to other accommodation which is adequate for them or their family's need. Assistance is generally granted for up to seven nights but can be extended, dependent on individual circumstances.

After these seven nights, Work and Income will arrange another appointment with the client to discuss their housing situation, and to determine if another grant is required. The Ministry works hard to support people receiving EH SNGs to secure a long-term housing solution, either through public housing or private rental accommodation.

Some people may struggle to access suitable housing due to a lack of available supply or they simply may not be able to meet the high cost of housing which may result in them receiving EH SNG support for an extended period of time.

The Ministry recognises that emergency housing is not a long-term solution, however, is a short-term solution for people who are potentially in a vulnerable situation. More

The Ministry understands that demand for housing across New Zealand is growing, and more people are experiencing a severe and immediate need. This demand is generated by a shortage of affordable housing, rising house prices, and rent growth. People on low incomes are most affected by rising housing costs, and many seek financial help from the Ministry.

The Ministry's role is to assess eligibility for public housing, provide financial support to eligible people to access and sustain suitable housing, and to provide immediate assistance to meet emergency housing needs.

The year 2020, has seen a significant increase in demand for emergency housing as the Ministry supported people through the COVID-19 pandemic period with accommodation where they could safely self-isolate. Due to the COVID-19 lockdown restrictions, people also could not easily move out of emergency housing into long-term accommodation which contributed to longer durations of stay and higher costs.

Before the December 2016 quarter, emergency housing-related hardship grants were coded in the Ministry's IT system as 'other emergency grants' which included hardship grants for various other emergency reasons. The Ministry cannot disaggregate emergency housing hardship payments from other types of assistance granted under the 'other emergency grants' category before the December 2016 quarter as it is recorded in notes on individual case files. As such, your request for the information in question 1-4 cannot be broken down for the past five years as requested and is refused under section 18(f) of the Act as in order to provide you with this information Ministry staff would have to manually review thousands of files. The greater public interest is in the effective and efficient administration of the public service. The Ministry can provide you with data for the past three financial years, for the period 1 July 2017 to 30 June 2020.

I have considered whether the Ministry would be able to respond to your request given extra time, or the ability to charge for the information requested. I have concluded that, in either case, the Ministry's ability to undertake its work would still be prejudiced.

Recoverable assistance provides beneficiaries and people on low incomes with interest free loans to help them meet an immediate need. Repayment arrangements are agreed at the outset, taking clients circumstances and financial situation into account. The Ministry aims to ensure that clients make the best decision regarding recoverable assistance to avoid creating debt.

The Ministry has a variety of reporting tools available to look at debt. Each reporting method has its own strengths and limitations and serves different purposes for the Ministry.

In the Ministry's record system that contains client information e.g. demographics, when a client changes the benefit that they are receiving, or exits the benefit system, any debt they had is rolled into one total debt and this debt cannot then be disaggregated. As such, this system cannot be used to break debt down by debt type.

As such, the Ministry is unable to provide you with a response to the following part of your request where you have asked:

- *How much of this has been recovered by the Ministry from tenants/people using the accommodation.*

Your request for this information is refused under section 18(f) of the Act as in order to provide you with this information Ministry staff would have to manually review thousands of client files. The greater public interest is in the effective and efficient administration of the public service.

I have considered whether the Ministry would be able to respond to your request given extra time, or the ability to charge for the information requested. I have concluded that, in either case, the Ministry's ability to undertake its work would still be prejudiced.

However, the Ministry is able to provide you with the number of EH SNGs and the amount granted broken down by whether the EH SNG is recoverable or non-recoverable. This gives an indication as to the debt that is established from EH SNGs.

When a client qualifies for an EH SNG, the Ministry needs to determine if this is a recoverable or non-recoverable grant. The Ministry can consider a client's grant to be recoverable when:

- The client has failed to make a reasonable effort in the circumstances to access other sources of housing assistance.
- The client has unreasonably contributed to their immediate emergency housing need.
- The Ministry has been unable to recover the client's contribution for a previous Special Needs Grant for emergency housing.
- The client has not used the Special Needs Grant for emergency housing for the purpose, or for the period, for which the grant was made.

It is important to note that some numbers in table four have been suppressed and are represented by an 'S', in order to protect client privacy. Please also note that in table five and six some names have been withheld and are represented by 9(2)(a). The Ministry is unable to provide you with the exact number and name as releasing this information is likely to risk identifying the individuals concerned. As such, this information is withheld under section 9(2)(a) of the Act. The need to protect the privacy of these individual outweighs any public interest in the information.

The principles and purposes of the Official Information Act 1982 under which you made your request are:


- to create greater openness and transparency about the plans, work and activities of the Government,
- to increase the ability of the public to participate in the making and administration of our laws and policies and
- to lead to greater accountability in the conduct of public affairs.

This Ministry fully supports those principles and purposes. The Ministry therefore intends to make the information contained in this letter and any attached documents available to the wider public. The Ministry will do this by publishing this letter and attachments on the Ministry of Social Development's website. Your personal details will be deleted, and the Ministry will not publish any information that would identify you as the person who requested the information.
