Background	Rosa Kornfeld-Matte's visit to New Zealand
	Rosa was officially invited to visit New Zealand by Her Excellency Ms Jillian Dempster, Ambassador to the United Nations Office in Geneva.

The purpose of the visit is to study national legislation, policy, regulatory frameworks, institutions and practices, in seeking to identify best practices and gaps in the implementation of the existing law.

We understand that she will be seeking support to establish a new international treaty, the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Older Persons.

Rosa's visit involves meetings with Ministers and government officials, as well as local authorities and civil society representatives, whose functions are relevant to the issues covered by the Independent Expert's mandate. The Independent Expert's mandate is to determine the best way to strengthen the protection of the human rights of older persons.

At the end of her visit, on Thursday 12 March Rosa will meet with you to discuss her preliminary findings. She will then meet with high-level government officials.

This will be followed by a press conference. This conference will outline some of the key findings from the visit and will take place after the meeting with officials.

The Independent Expert's full findings and recommendations will be presented in a report to the UN Human Rights Council in September 2020.

## The role of an Independent Expert

Independent Experts are appointed by the United Nations Human Rights Council to examine and report back on a thematic or countryspecific perspective in all parts of the world.

This position is honorary. The Independent Experts are not members of staff of the United Nations, nor are they paid for their work. They express their views in an independent capacity and do not represent their respective Governments.

Their independent status is crucial to them being able to fulfil their functions in all impartiality.

#### Rosa Kornfeld-Matte

In May 2014, the Human Rights Council appointed Rosa as the first Independent Expert on the enjoyment of all human rights by older persons.

She previously served as the National Director of the Chilean National Service of Ageing, where she designed and implemented the National Policy of Ageing.

She has a long career as an academic and is the founder of the programme for older persons at the Pontifical Catholic University of Chile. This is her last country visit in this role.
