Emergency Housing SNGs | Feb 2024 |

Emergency housing is short-term accommodation (usually in motels) for individuals who have an urgent need because they are unable to remain in their usual place of residence. It is funded through Special Needs Grants that clients apply for when they cannot access accommodation and we have explored all the other options available to them. Grants can cover between one and 21 nights of accommodation at a time

Commentary

The number of households in emergency housing has continued to decrease for the seventh consecutive month to 2,874 at the end of February 2024, down by 6 compared to last month. The number of households in emergency housing in February is the lowest it has been since April 2020.

The number of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants (EH-SNGs) has decreased by 96 last month (1%). Most regions saw a decrease, except Wellington and Auckland, up by 21 and 9 households respectively.

There was \$0.2 million less and 96 more EH-SNGs granted during February 2024 compared to January 2024. This increase in grants during February is a consistent seasonal trend since 2019.

Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.

Commentary

This increase is potentially due to more new applications (up 288) in February compared to January 2024. Most regions saw an increase in the number of Public Housing Register applications, except Canterbury and Waikato, down by 54 and 6 respectively.

Of the 873 applicants who were housed, 405 (46 percent) were households with children, 85 more than January 2024.
