Emergency Housing SNGs | Jun 2024 |

Emergency housing is short-term accommodation (usually in motels) for individuals who have an urgent need because they are unable to remain in their usual place of residence. It is funded through Special Needs Grants that clients apply for when they cannot access accommodation and we have explored all the other options available to them. Grants can cover between one and 21 nights of accommodation





Commentary

The number of households in emergency housing has continued to decrease since August 2023 to 1,959 at the end of June 2024, down by 321 compared to last month. The latest month-end number of households in emergency housing has returned to pre-pandemic levels.


All regions saw a decrease in the number of households, except Southern and West Coast-Tasman (up by three and unchanged respectively).


The number of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants (EH-SNGs) has decreased by 1,854 (28.5 percent) to 4,653 with \$6.7 million fewer granted during June 2024 compared to May 2024.




Emergency housing - at the end of the month














Public Housing Register | 30 Jun 2024 |

The Public Housing Register is a non-time bound list of all applicants eligible to be placed in public housing. Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.




Public Housing Register numbers















Public Housing Register flow



Commentary

The number of Public Housing Register applications has decreased by 654 (2.3 percent) to 27,861 at the end of June 2024.

This monthly decrease is potentially due to 441 fewer applicants entering onto the register.

Most regions saw a decrease in the number of Public Housing Register applications, except Wellington and West Coast-Tasman.

Of the 951 applicants who were housed, 504 (53 percent) were households with children, 84 fewer than May 2024.

MSD reports total response ethnicity.
