Emergency Housing SNGs | May 2024

Emergency housing is short-term accommodation (usually in motels) for individuals who have an urgent need because they are unable to remain in their usual place of residence. It is funded through Special Needs Grants that clients apply for when they cannot access accommodation and we have explored all the other options available to them. Grants can cover between one and 21 nights of accommodation at a time.





Commentary

The number of households in emergency housing has continued to decrease for the tenth consecutive month to 2,280 at the end of May 2024, down by 252 compared to last month. The number of households in emergency housing in May has returned to pre-pandemic levels.


Most regions saw a decrease in the number of households, in particular Auckland, Wellington and Canterbury (down by 114, 48 and 42 respectively).


The number of Emergency Housing Special Needs Grants (EH-SNGs) has decreased by 78 (1.2 percent) to 6,507 with \$0.42 million fewer granted during May 2024 compared to April 2024.



Public Housing Register | 31 May 2024

The Public Housing Register is a non-time bound list of all applicants eligible to be placed in public housing. Applicants complete a public housing assessment which determines eligibility and priority for public housing against an agreed set of criteria, which is then used to assist the public housing provider in matching to the most appropriate property.






Public Housing Register numbers















Public Housing Register flow



Commentary

The number of Public Housing Register applications has decreased by 1,002 (3.4 percent) to 28,512 at the end of May 2024.

This monthly decrease is potentially due to more applicants being housed in public housing and more households with applications moved to closure pending status.

Applicants with closure pending indicates they have been put on hold for over 21 days for reasons such as no longer required social housing, unable to confirm eligibility, declined reason reviewed, or no longer eligible.

All regions saw an decrease in the number of Public Housing Register applications.

Of the 1,068 applicants who were housed, 590 (55.2 percent) were households with children, 152 more than April 2024.

MSD reports total response ethnicity.
